Bibs & Blather Two Million and Counting

Cites & Insights reached a milestone this year—twice. That milestone: **Two million words**. That's the equivalent of anywhere from 20 to 40 typical books. It is, by any measure, a lot of blather.

I say "twice" because the past year included a fair amount of republishing, and there had been some of it before. As a raw count—including all occurrences of the masthead, "Inside this Issue" and repeated material—the count passed two million words in the January 2009 issue. *Excluding* "Inside this issue," the masthead and repeated material longer than a paragraph or so, the count passed two million words in April 2009. The difference, roughly 97,000 words, accounts for just under five percent of the material.

Through January 2009, the issues totaled just under 2,500 pages; through April, just over 2,600. Page and word counts exclude the annual indices and the phantom *Cites on a Plane* issue.

Overall Readership

There's a nice certainty to the word count and page count. After that, things get a little fuzzy. Cites & Insights began on the webspace that came with my AT&T dialup account; no usage figures were available. I really have no idea what the readership was like for the first two years—except that there was enough feedback to keep it going.

From late 2002 (the first issue in volume 3, published in December 2002) through early August 2006, *Cites & Insights* was hosted by Boise State University Libraries. During that time, there were just under 487,000 pageviews in some 546,000 sessions, representing 141,120 unique IP addresses from 157 different countries and other top-level domains.

Since mid-August 2006 (the September 2006 issue), Cites & Insights has had its own domain, hosted

on LISHost. But the domain moved in mid-March 2009 from one server to another, making for a discontinuity in logging. As far as I can tell, from mid-August 2006 through mid-March 2009, there were around 808,000 pageviews in 270,000 sessions, representing just under 76,000 unique IP addresses from 158 countries and other top-level domains.

The higher pageview count and lower session count make sense: HTML versions didn't begin until 2006 (with some retrospective conversion). It's hard to say whether readership is growing, shrinking or roughly the same—although those numbers might suggest some shrinkage.

Most Widely-Read Issues

These figures are at best a little fuzzy, since they entirely omit the first two years and come from two different statistical packages. They're also complicated by the HTML factor. So let's call this "most widely-downloaded full issues from December 2002 through early March 2009." Note that I've excluded PDF pageviews; to the extent that people can view PDFs without downloading them, issue readership may be undercounted.

The hot pair

You already know the most widely-downloaded issue: Volume 6 Issue 2, *Library 2.0 and "Library 2.0,"* with 21,952 downloads (**not** including all the HTML views). One other issue shows more than 10,000 downloads: Volume 3 Issue 9, Midsummer 2003. That's also a special issue: *Coping with CIPA: A Censorware Special*.

A dozen issues have been downloaded 6,000 to 8,000 times. In descending order, there are four with

more than 7,000 downloads: Volume 4 Issue 12, Volume 3 Issue 14, Volume 5 Issue 10, Volume 3 Issue 8. Eight more have 6,000 to 7,000: Volume 6 Issue 10, Volume 4 Issue 3, Volume 4 Issue 2, Volume 3 Issue 11, Volume 3 Issue 12, Volume 3 Issue 1, the Volume 2 index, and Volume 4 Issue 1. I have no idea what (if anything) makes these issues special.

Notably, these are mostly older issues; Cites & Insights issues keep accumulating readership over time. Another 13 issues (including one index) have from 5,000 to 5,999 downloads—and those are all from volumes 3, 4 and 5. (Looked at pessimistically, this would suggest that 2003 through 2005 were the glory years and I should quit—but I prefer "readership builds over time.") Twenty more issues and indexes have 4,000 to 4,877 downloads.

Of the 123 issues through mid-March 2009 (115 issues plus eight indexes), 12 have fewer than 1,000 downloads and 25 have fewer than 2,000. My checkpoint for "enough readers" has, informally, been 700 or so—and no issue that's been around more than four months fails to hit that target. Four of the 12 low-readership issues come from 2001 and 2002, meaning that many readers aren't counted.

Most Widely-Read Recent Essays

If the issue download counts are a little fuzzy thanks to multiple sites, it gets worse for essay readership. I've added the HTML pageviews for essays (or, in one case, PDF downloads for the separate essay PDF) to the PDF downloads for the issues in which those essays appeared. In some special-issue cases, I didn't prepare an HTML separate—and, of course, there aren't any HTML separates for the first three years.

In addition, 52 articles appear to have 6,000 to 6,999 readers and 42 have 5,000 to 5,999.

Conclusions?

Not many. I haven't tried grouping articles by topic to see whether some topics are more popular than others, partly because I don't think basic readership should be the controlling factor in how *Cites & Insights* works.

My general conclusion is that, despite fewer links from other sites than issues used to get, *Cites & Insights* still has enough readers—and is generally still enough fun—to be worth doing. Thanks to all of you for keeping it that way.

The Rest of the Issue

I can take a hint. Maybe not rapidly, but I *can* take a hint. When I've studied liblogs and reported the results here, for free, the articles have been widely read—more than 14,000 apparent readers in one case, more than 20,000 in another case. (See above.)

When I've tried to do that in book form, for a modest charge, not so much: To date, 80 copies of *Public Library Blogs* and 45 copies of *Academic Library Blogs*. *The Liblog Landscape* 2007-2008 isn't quite burning up the market, either, with 50 copies to date, but it's a year newer.

Some authors find that making some or all of their books available for free improved sales of the print books. I don't expect that to be the case for the two library blog books. In retrospect, they were not as well thought out as they could have been. If I was doing them again, they'd have more in common with *The Liblog Landscape 2007-2008*—but would that make any difference?

What I'm doing here is offering most of the "first half" of each library blog book for free, with almost no editing. I'm not including the individual blog descriptions and samples. I'm also not including the complete lists of blogs and institutions, since those serve no real purpose outside book form (and are already available in .xls form on the web in any case). Will I offer the "first half" of *the Liblog Landscape 2007-2008* in a later issue (which, all by itself, would be a large issue)? Hard to say.

Public Library Blogs

Should your public library have a blog—or more blogs than it already has?

I can't answer that question. I can say there's a good chance your library could benefit from one or more blogs.

If anyone tells you that your library *must* have a blog, they're wrong. Very few solutions apply to every public library, no matter how large or small.

On the other hand, hundreds of public libraries (serving as few as 400 people and as many as 2.3 million) already use blogs to good effect. I believe thousands of public libraries could serve their communities well by initiating blogs or adding new blogs.

Why This Book?

This book won't tell you how to start and maintain a blog. You can find plenty of advice within the library

literature and elsewhere, including sources as diverse as Michael P. Sauer's *Blogging and RSS: a librarian's guide* (Information Today, 2006) and the first week's content in the **Five Weeks to a Social Library** course (www.sociallibraries.com/course/week1). For that matter, you can go to blogger (blogger.com) or wordpress (wordpress.com) and try one out, just to get started: It doesn't take long and it's absolutely free.

If you're reading this, you're probably thinking about a blog for your library or considering adding more to what you already have. Or you're at one of the 196 libraries included here and want to see how your blogs compare to others.

You could check out every public library blog listed in the two major sources (the "Weblogs – Public Libraries" page of *LISWiki* at liswiki.org/wiki/Weblogs__Public_Libraries and the "Public libraries" page of *Blogging Libraries Wiki* at www.blogwithoutalibrary.net/links/index.php?title=Public_libraries). But that's more than 530 links (in early August 2007)—a lot of blogs to go through.

The purpose of this book is to guide you to blogs that you might find particularly useful when thinking about your own library's case—blogs from nearby libraries, blogs from libraries with similar service populations or blogs that specialize in topics or work in ways that you'll find interesting.

Most of this book is examples: 252 blogs from 196 libraries, arranged geographically. It's not a comprehensive survey (I did exclude non-English blogs for reasons of practicality), but I did attempt complete coverage given a few basic criteria. I was impressed by the diversity and quality of what's out there.

What's a Blog?

A blog is a web site or portion of a web site consisting of multiple entries organized in reverse chronological order—that is, with the most recent entry at the top.

That's it—as much as I want to define blogs for the purpose of this book and maybe as tightly as you should define blogs in general. Here are other elements frequently included in definitions of blogs and why I don't include them here:

- ➤ A website: Some of the blogs here function within larger websites, and that can be appropriate for library purposes.
- Archived by date: Some library blogs, typically those devoted to library events, don't have visible archives—and that can be appropriate.
- ➤ Relatively brief entries: While most library blogs run to one-paragraph entries, sometimes

- very brief paragraphs, there are also interesting blogs consisting of longer essays.
- Links: It's possible to have worthwhile library blogs that don't have any links at all.
- Permalink for each post: In some cases, permalinks serve no purpose in specialized library blogs.
- ➤ Built with blogging software: Just as blogging software can be used for very different purposes, blogs can run on content management software or custom-built software.
- ➤ Comments: While comments can increase community interaction and may be a sign of blogs as social software, many public library blogs don't allow comments, sometimes for excellent reasons—and even more blogs don't have any comments.
- ➤ Categories or tags: Whether categories or tags are needed or useful depends on the purpose of the blog and its relationship to the library's website in general.
- ➤ **Dated entries**: There are very few occasions in which undated blog entries make sense—but "very few" does not equal "none."

As general as I'm trying to be in defining a blog, it's true that two or three candidate blogs were excluded from this survey if they did *not* have dated entries—and if they did not have any form of archive, unless the home page itself ran back to December 2006 or earlier.

Criteria for Inclusion

My intent was to include a broadly representative sample of successful and active English-language public library blogs. Here's how I went about it.

- ▶ I activated *every* English-language public library blog link in the two wiki lists noted above—the *LISWiki* public library blog list and the *Blogging Libraries* public library blog list. I added selective blogs from the "Library director" page of *Blogging libraries* if the blogs showed links to public libraries.
- ➤ If the blog couldn't be reached or it was obvious that it had ceased by February 2007 or began in 2007, I crossed it off the printed checklists I'd made of each blog list. Otherwise, I subscribed to its feed in a special Bloglines section for this purpose.
- ➤ Baseline criteria: The blog must have at least one post before calendar 2007 and must have at least one post in two of the three months used for

evaluation: March, April and May 2007. If a blog began in 2007, it's a little early to call it "successful"—while official library blogs seem less prone to enthusiastic starts and quick fadeouts than individual blogs, it still happens all too often. If a blog didn't include posts in at least two of the three spring months, it seemed fair to call it inactive. I can think of reasons why a blog might be silent for most or all of the summer; it's hard to imagine why an active blog would go silent for all of March and April, all of April and May, or all of March and all of May.

- ➤ Quick examination yielded a set of 238 blogs out of roughly 360 candidates (excluding duplicates). I encountered at least 68 defunct blogs and another 19 that weren't reachable. Sixteen blogs on the lists began in 2007—and I'm sure many more have, but aren't yet in the wikis. At least eight were non-English. Nine or more either weren't blogs at all or weren't from public libraries.
- Exporting the Bloglines section containing the 238 blogs, I imported the OPML to Excel, stripping out unnecessary columns and adding new columns for the metrics used in this study.
- ➤ I went through each blog, measuring the number of posts during March-May 2007, total length of posts, number of comments received on those posts (in some cases correcting for spam comments) and the number of illustrations (photos, book jackets and others) in those posts. I stored the name of the library and its Zip code (or Canadian postal code) and looked for the library's service area population using Worldcat Registry (and other sources when that didn't work). I also looked at the relationship of the blog to the library website and noted interesting blog template choices. Finally, I looked at two crude measures of blog visibility, although those measures are even less interesting and meaningful for library blogs than they are for personal liblogs.
- For the course of studying the blogs, another 29 fell by the wayside, most commonly because they failed to have at least one post in at least two of the three study months. One turned out to be a mischaracterized academic library blog; a few had gone missing between the initial pass and the second pass. In a couple of cases, I couldn't verify the age of the blog or analyze its contents because posts were undated or there was no archive of any sort. I note a few of those

- blogs in a later chapter: While they didn't fit the study, they might still be worth checking out.
- ➤ That left me with 209 blogs representing 196 libraries. I then went back through these 196 libraries to add *other* blogs that met my criteria but weren't listed in either wiki. I limited each multi-blog library to a maximum of five blogs, which was only an issue with one or two libraries.
- ➤ The final list, represented in the last twelve chapters of this book, is 252 blogs from 196 libraries.

If that's too much detail for you, here are the criteria in brief: Each blog had to be English-language, beginning no later than December 2006, with at least one post in two of the three months March, April and May 2007—and with enough internal evidence to demonstrate those criteria.

Blogs by Type and Service Population

What "type" is a blog? In some cases it's clear from the name of the blog. In others, I assigned a type based on content of the posts within the study period. (Note: The Zip or Postal code would guide you to the blog discussion within the book.)

General and Multipurpose Blogs

This catchall includes most multipurpose blogs that aren't aimed at an age group—blogs that include library news and hours, events, new materials, reviews, what have you. This catchall type also includes those cases where the library webpage is a blog.

What's Feasible?

The list above should challenge some of your assumptions as to what smaller libraries can and can't do. Book review blogs when your library serves fewer than 15,000? See 46923, 06096, 02090. Do directors of under-20,000-user libraries do their own blogs? Maybe even 10,000! See 05301, 06820, 10924, 60521—and, a little larger, the remarkable back-and-forth blog at 60901.

Surely only larger libraries could devote blogs to genealogy? 46511: Service area 3,100. A children's book blog from a 9,100-person library: 45419. Teen blogs for libraries of under 20,000? Eight of them—go look at the list (and don't forget the YA blog for a library serving 8,700 people).

As for doing blogs at all—well, the two libraries "under 1,000" actually have service area populations of fewer than 400 each. In both cases (as in a couple of other cases), the blog is the library's homepage—and it works well.

What's Not Here

I didn't include blogs that clearly began in 2007 or gave no evidence of starting earlier. Given the rate of failure for very young blogs, it didn't seem realistic to include these startups. I also didn't include blogs that had no posts after February 2007—or, for that matter, that only had one post within the March-May 2007 period. They're definitely dormant and may have ceased.

Here are a few special cases that might be worth a look—blogs and bloglike sites that have been around for a while (or *may have* been around for a while) but didn't work for the body of this book.

Champaign Library Events (www.champaign.org/events) began in August 2006. It provides either a "month view" with color-coded items for days with events, or a "day view" with a little more information—but for past months, you can only see one day view at a time. All but two of the 91 days in the study quarter had events, and there are probably more than 200 posts. It's an interesting approach that just didn't fit.

Morrill Public Library (www.hiawathalibrary.org) appears to be using a blog as its home page (each entry has a "Posted in" mark with categories and "No comments" note). It's another clean example of using blog software as a library website. But the entries aren't dated and there's no archive whatsoever—which may work perfectly well for the library's purposes (and is certainly worth a look), but meant I couldn't verify eligibility or track posts during March-May 2007.

Pontiac Public Library (www.pontiacpubliclibrary. org/drupal/) is also in one of the library blog wikis and has the look of a blog-populated front page (again with no dates and no archive), but "drupal" suggests that it's driven by an open-source content management system rather than blogging software. Also clean, open, worth a visit.

The *PVLD Director's Blog* (Palos Verdes Library District, pvlddirectorsblog.typepad.com/kathy/) looks to be an interesting Directors' Blog, including some feedback—but there's no archive or other way to retrieve older posts and the earliest visible post is from July 2007.

Consider *Library Events* from the West Branch Public Library (www.westbranchlibrary.com/events.htm): The clean, open page says "Powered by Blogger" and a big "87" above a list of events suggests a blog entry—but there's no navigation at all. Again, this may work just fine for the patrons of West Branch—after all, do you really need to look back at old events?

Metrics and Standouts

What makes a library blog a success? That depends on the library. Each of the blogs may qualify as a success for the people who produce it and the patrons who read it. I'm not planning to praise specific blogs. I'm *certainly* not planning to critique the writing.

What I can do as an outside observer is *describe* the blogs. A few metrics help flesh out that description. Here, I'd like to explain the metrics used and list the outliers—the blogs in the top quintile (top 20%) of a given metric.

Defining the Metrics

I noted and calculated the following metrics, in all cases based on tracking blog posts from March 1 through May 31, 2007.

- ➤ Number of posts: A simple count of blogging frequency. There were 91 days and 13 weeks in the quarter. You can calculate other frequencies based on that, although some blogs clump several posts on one day then go several days without posts. In one or two cases (noted in the profiles), I counted posts for one month and multiplied by three—because it was too cumbersome to count posts for all three months.
- Number of comments and comments per post:
 Many blogs don't support comments. Many more didn't have any. In a couple of cases where there were quite a few comments on one post and none on others, I found that the comments were spam and discounted them. Blog profiles include comments per post when that ratio is at least 0.3 (that is, three comments for every 10 posts), the mean figure for all blogs.
- ➤ Number of illustrations and illustrations per post: Quite a few blogs don't use illustrations. Others have at least one illustration for every post. I include illustrations per post within the blog profile when that ratio is greater than 0.7, the mean figure for all blogs.
- ➤ Total words and average post length: I included blog overhead within posts (e.g., "No comments" and "Posted on..."), but not around posts (sidebar contents). In a few cases (noted in profiles) where it was difficult to copy-and-paste blog archives, I determined the length of the most recent 10 (in one case 20) posts and extrapolated the overall length from that figure. Profiles don't include total words, but the most voluminous blogs are noted later in this chapter.
- ➤ **Longevity**: The profile includes the month in which the first post appeared, based on internal evidence.
- Visibility: This may be an entirely meaningless figure for public libraries, since blog visibility

within a community may show up in ways that don't influence this number. Profiles only include a visibility note when the visibility factor (described below) was at least 1.0.

The Visibility Factor is a SWAG—a statistical wild-ass guess as to a blog's visibility within the broader community. It's become more difficult to estimate visibility over time, as search engines have made it more difficult to count actual links to a blog. It's also clear that visibility isn't a linear issue: A blog with 1,200 Technorati links and 1,000 Bloglines subscriptions is *not* "ten times as visible" as one with 120 links and 100 subscriptions; it's perhaps twice as visible.

The Visibility Factor used for this book is a logarithmic measure: Log10 (that is, logarithm to base 10) of the sum of Technorati links and Bloglines subscribers, as reported by the website *popuri.us*. For 209 of the blogs, the *popuri.us* check was done on the same day in late May 2007. For the other 43 ("additional blogs" from the 196 libraries in the study), the check was done during the last week of July 2007. Visibility factors less than 1.0 are not reported.

I'm calling visibility factors between 1.0 and 1.9 "slightly visible" (the sum of links and subscribers is between 10 and 99). 2.0 to 2.9 "visible" (the sum is between 100 and 999). 3.0 to 3.9 "quite visible" (the sum is between 1,000 and 10,000). If there are any in the 4.0-4.9 range, they're labeled as "highly visible." In the broader blogging world, "A-list blogs" have visibility factors in the 5.0 to 6.9 range.

For any set of metrics this large and varied, two "averages" both have meaning and tend to be different. What's usually called the average is the mean: The total of all values divided by the number of values. A few high values can throw off the mean significantly. Another average worth paying attention to is the median—the value for which half of the values are higher and half are lower.

Posts

I counted or extrapolated 5,976 posts among 253 blogs for the three months of March, April and May 2007. That's a mean of 23.7 posts—a bit less than two posts a week, not a bad average for blogs. But the median was 12.0 posts: Slightly under one post a week.

Working up from the least frequent (and noting that any blog with fewer than two posts was excluded), 26 of the blogs had two or three posts—no more than one a month on average. Another 40 had four to six posts, still less than one every two weeks. Thus, just over 26% of the blogs had very infrequent

posts. Sixty-six more blogs (another 26%) had seven to 12 posts—more than one every two weeks, less than one a week.

Getting from median to mean, 49 blogs had 13 to 23 posts—more than one but less than two per week. Another 20 had 24 to 32 posts—and that brings us up to the 20% of blogs with most frequent postings (shown in descending order):

Comments

Blogs *may* be a great way to increase community involvement—but don't be too surprised if your library blog doesn't get many comments. While there were 1,768 comments on the posts—an average (mean) of seven per blog—that's a wildly misleading average. Nearly one-quarter of those comments were attached to gaming-related posts at Ann Arbor District Library's blog. The three most-commented blogs had 647 comments between them: 37% of the total, leaving 1,121 for the 249 other blogs, or an average of 4.5 per blog.

That number's also misleading. Only 118 of the 252 blogs had any comments at all, and another 25 had one comment each. The median number of comments is zero, since more than half the blogs had no comments. Many didn't allow them (entirely reasonable for an events blog) and many others just didn't have any. Fact is, it can be tough to get comments on an official blog—particularly if it doesn't involve trash-talking teenagers.

Blogs with more than five comments over the three-month period make up just less than 20% of the blogs. Here they are, in order by descending number of comments:

Comments per Post

If the median number of comments is zero, the median comments per post must also be zero. The mean number of comments per post—the average—is a modest 0.3, and only 45 blogs manage to beat that average. Instead of listing the 20% of blogs with the highest ratio, here are the 41 blogs (16%) with at least half a comment per blog during the three months:

Illustrations

Some book and book review blogs use book covers to illustrate almost every post. Some blogs include a fair number of photographs. Some use icons. A few blogs appear to use original miniature landscapes as illustrations. And, of course, some blogs don't use illustrations at all—70 of the 252 blogs had not a single illustration during the three-month study period. In all, there were 4,691 illustrations attached to the 5,976 posts.

The average number of illustrations is 18.6—but the median is 5.0. The top quintile begins at 24 illustrations over three months—almost five times the median and about one-third more than average.

Illustrations per Post

As with comments, the raw number of illustrations can be misleading—very busy blogs tend to have more illustrations. The average number of illustrations per post may be a more meaningful number. Here, the

median and the mean are close together: the average or mean is 0.7 illustrations per post, while the median is 0.5 illustrations per post.

Too many blogs have 1.0 illustrations per post to draw a boundary anywhere near the 20% mark. That makes sense: What's more natural for some types of blog than to have exactly one illustration per post? (Actually, for a variety of reasons, "one illustration per post" tends to mean anywhere from 0.8 to 1.1 illustrations per post.)

The top group in this case is 44 blogs with at least 1.1 illustrations per post—17% of the blogs.

Total Length of Posts

Here's a metric that doesn't appear directly within blog profiles: Total words in all posts for March through May 2007. "Words" includes internal post overhead such as "Permalink" or "x Comments" or "Posted on..." but not sidebar material. In a few cases, overall words are extrapolated from a sample of the first 10 or 20 posts...

The complete set of posts totaled 1,038,237 words—roughly ten full-length novels. The average blog had 4,120 words in all its posts, but the median was less than half that number: 1,968 words. That's not too surprising: 69 blogs had fewer than 1,000 words each.

In this case, the set of "long blogs" is a little more than 20% of all blogs, using 5,000 words as a cutoff:

Average Post Length

Traditional blog advice—if there is such a thing as tradition for blogs—is that posts should be brief, no more than a paragraph or so. While you can turn almost anything into a single paragraph, typical paragraphs run 75 to 150 words, frequently much fewer. This paragraph, for example, is 53 words.

The "average average" post length—that is, the average of all words-per-post figures for the blogs—was 187.3 words, roughly two typical paragraphs. The median was 153.8 words, roughly one long paragraph.

Uniquely for this metric, it makes sense to point out two outlying groups: The blogs with considerably longer-than-average posts...and the blogs with considerably *shorter*-than-average posts ("terse blogs").

Longevity

All of these blogs have been around since at least December 2006—that's one of the rules for inclusion. Some have been around a while longer.

Most of these blogs began in 2006—155 of the 252. Another 38 began in the last half of 2005. That leaves the blogs that had been around for at least two years by the end of the study.

There's a special case at the start of this list: Waterboro's *h20boro lib blog*. You can't date the blog by internal evidence—but I *know* this blog has been around since the start of the millennium, since I wrote about it then. Within a year, blogs are arranged by the month in which they began.

That said, there are a handful of public library blogs with more general visibility than most, possibly because they've been around a while, they've been used as examples in various articles, books and sessions, or they have unusually compelling content:

Academic Library Blogs

Should your academic library have a blog—or more blogs than it already has? I can't answer that question.

I can say there's a good chance your library could benefit from one or more blogs.

If anyone tells you that your library *must* have a blog, they're wrong. Very few solutions apply to every library, no matter how large or small.

On the other hand, dozens of academic libraries already use blogs to good effect. I believe most academic libraries could serve their communities well by initiating blogs or adding new blogs—although some of those blogs might not *look* like blogs.

Special Note

If you've already read *Public Library Blogs: 252 Examples*, much of the wording in the first few chapters here may seem familiar. That's not surprising. I used the same methodology for academic library blogs as for public library blogs—the same time period, the same rules for inclusion, the same metrics. The only real difference is that I didn't attempt to determine the size of user communities for academic library blogs.

Since I wrote the public library book first, I'm reusing the first few chapters—but, of course, all the facts are different...

Why This Book?

This book won't tell you how to start and maintain a blog. You can find plenty of advice within the library literature and elsewhere, including sources as diverse as Michael P. Sauer's *Blogging and RSS: a librarian's guide* (Information Today, 2006) and the first week's content in the **Five Weeks to a Social Library** course (www.sociallibraries.com/course/week1). For that matter, you can go to blogger (blogger.com) or wordpress (wordpress.com) and try one out, just to get started: It doesn't take long and it's absolutely free.

If you're reading this, you're probably thinking about a blog for your library or adding more to what you already have. Or you're at one of the 165 academic institutions or libraries included here and want to see how your blogs compare to others.

You could check out every academic library blog listed in the two major sources (the "Weblogs – Academic Libraries" page of *LISWiki* at liswi-ki.org/wiki/Weblogs_-_Academic_Libraries and the "Academic libraries" page of *Blogging Libraries Wiki* at www.blogwithoutalibrary.net/links/index.php?title=Academic_libraries). But that's more than 525 links (in late December 2007)—a lot of blogs to go through.

The purpose of this book is to guide you to blogs that you might find useful when thinking about your own library's case—blogs from nearby libraries, blogs from institutions you consider peers or blogs that specialize in topics or work in ways that you'll find interesting.

Most of this book is examples: 231 blogs from 156 institutions (165 libraries) arranged geographically. It's not a comprehensive survey (I did exclude non-English blogs for reasons of practicality), but I did attempt complete coverage given a few basic criteria.

Criteria for Inclusion

My intent was to include a broadly representative sample of successful and active English-language academic library blogs. Here's how I went about it.

- ➤ I activated *every* English-language public library blog link in the two wiki lists noted above—the *LISWiki* academic library blog list and the *Blogging Libraries* academic library blog list. I added selective blogs from the "Library director" page of *Blogging libraries* if the blogs showed links to academic libraries.
- ➤ If the blog couldn't be reached or it was obvious that it had ceased by February 2007 or began in 2007, I crossed it off the printed checklists I'd made of each blog list. Otherwise, I subscribed to its feed in a special Bloglines section for this purpose.
- Baseline criteria: The blog must have at least one post before calendar 2007 and must have at least one post in two of the three months used for evaluation: March, April and May 2007. If a blog began in 2007, it's a little early to call it "successful"—while official library blogs seem less prone to enthusiastic starts and quick fadeouts than individual blogs, it still happens all too often. If a blog didn't include posts in at least two of the three spring months, it seemed fair to call it inactive. I can think of reasons why an academic library blog might be silent for most or all of the summer; it's hard to imagine why an active blog would go silent for all of March and April, all of April and May, or all of March and all of May.
- More than 160 blogs that were in the candidate lists didn't make it into this study. Fifty-four had ceased by February 2007. Twenty-three were new in 2007. Twenty-three aren't in English. Twenty-two were still around but inactive by my minimal standards: That is, they only had posts in one of the three months listed. Seventeen were problematic—they had no archives, un-

dated posts, or other technical issues that made it impossible to determine whether they qualified. Finally, 23 were "wrong" for one reason or another: The URL didn't work, the blog wasn't from an academic library, what I reached wasn't a blog at all. If you're trying to add these figures up to the overall total, the remainder are duplicates: Blogs that appear in both wikis.

- Some libraries have more than one blog; some have *many*. I took up to five blogs for a given library (or group of libraries within the same zip code). In a few cases, I discovered additional blogs for a library while doing metrics—and added those, again with a five-blog limit.
- ➤ I went through each blog, measuring the number of posts during March-May 2007, total length of posts, number of comments received on those posts and the number of illustrations (photos, book jackets and others) in those posts. I stored the name of the library and its Zip code (or Canadian postal code). I also looked at the relationship of the blog to the library website and noted blog template choices. Finally, I looked at two crude measures of blog visibility, although those measures are even less interesting and meaningful for library blogs than they are for personal liblogs.
- ➤ The final list, represented in the last twelve chapters of this book, is 231 blogs from 165 libraries or groups of libraries within 156 academic institutions or campuses.

If that's too much detail for you, here are the criteria in brief: Each blog had to be English-language, beginning no later than December 2006, with at least one post in two of the three months March, April and May 2007—and with enough internal evidence to demonstrate those criteria.

Blogs by Type

What "type" is a blog? In some cases it's clear from the name of the blog. In others, I assigned a type based on content of the posts within the study period or the nature of the library. I omitted general-purpose and library news blogs.

Metrics and Standouts

What makes a library blog a success? That depends on the library. Each of the 231 blogs profiled in the book may qualify as a success for the people who produce it and the patrons who read it...

What I can do as an outside observer is *describe* the blogs. A few metrics help flesh out that description. Here, I'd like to explain the metrics used and list the outliers—the blogs in the top quintile (top 20%) of a given metric.

Defining the Metrics

I noted and calculated the following metrics, in all cases based on tracking blog posts from March 1 through May 31, 2007.

- ➤ Number of posts: A simple count of blogging frequency. There were 91 days and 13 weeks in the quarter. You can calculate other frequencies based on that, although some blogs clump several posts on one day then go several days without posts. In one or two cases (noted in the profiles), I counted posts for one month and multiplied by three—because it was too cumbersome to count posts for all three months.
- Number of comments and comments per post: Many blogs don't support comments. Many more didn't have any. In a couple of cases where there were quite a few comments on one post and none on others, I found that the comments were spam and discounted them. Blog profiles include comments per post when that ratio is at least 0.1 (that is, one comment for every 10 posts), the mean figure for all blogs.
- ➤ Number of illustrations and illustrations per post: Quite a few blogs don't use illustrations. Others have at least one illustration for every

- post. I include illustrations per post within the blog profile when that ratio is greater than 0.4, the mean figure for all blogs.
- ➤ Total words and average post length: I included blog overhead within posts (e.g., "No comments" and "Posted on..."), but not around posts (sidebar contents)...
- ➤ **Longevity**: The profile includes the month in which the first post appeared, based on internal evidence.
- ➤ Visibility: This may be an entirely meaningless figure for libraries, since blog visibility within a library community may show up in ways that don't influence this number. Profiles only include a visibility note when the visibility factor (described below) was at least 1.0.

The Visibility Factor is a SWAG—a statistical wild-ass guess as to a blog's visibility within the broader community. It's become more difficult to estimate visibility over time, as search engines have made it more difficult to count actual links to a blog. It's also clear that visibility isn't a linear issue: A blog with 1,200 Technorati links and 1,000 Bloglines subscriptions is *not* "ten times as visible" as one with 120 links and 100 subscriptions; it's perhaps twice as visible.

The Visibility Factor used for this book is a logarithmic measure: Log10 (that is, logarithm to base 10) of the sum of Technorati links and Bloglines subscribers, as reported by the website *popuri.us*. Because quite a few blogs were added during the survey, I checked all blogs on December 29-30, 2007. Visibility factors less than 1.0 are not reported. I'm calling visibility factors between 1.0 and 1.9 "slightly visible" (the sum of links and subscribers is between 10 and 99). 2.0 to 2.9 "visible" (the sum is between 100 and 999). 3.0 to 3.9 "quite visible" (the sum is between 1,000 and 10,000). Any in the 4.0-4.9 range are labeled as "highly visible." "A-list blogs" have visibility factors in the 5.0 to 6.9 range, which I call "extremely visible."

For any set of metrics this large and varied, two "averages" both have meaning and tend to be different. What's usually called the average is the mean: The total of all values divided by the number of values. A few high values can throw off the mean significantly. Another average worth paying attention to is the median—the value for which half of the values are higher and half are lower.

Posts

I counted 6,229 posts among 231 blogs for the three months of March, April and May 2007. That's a mean

of 27 posts—a bit more than two posts a week, not a bad average for blogs. But the median was 14.0 posts: Just over one post a week.

Working up from the least frequent, 15 of the blogs had two or three posts—no more than one a month on average. Another 29 had four to six posts, less than one every two weeks. Thus, just over 19% of the blogs had very infrequent posts. Fifty-four more blogs (another 23%) had seven to 12 posts—more than one every two weeks, less than one a week. Eighteen had 13 or 14 posts, bringing us up to the median.

Getting from median to mean, 53 blogs had 15 to 26 posts—more than one but no more than two per week. Another 18 had 27 to 34 posts—and that brings us up to the 20% of blogs with most frequent postings (shown in descending order):

Comments

Blogs *may* be a great way to increase community involvement—but don't be too surprised if your library blog doesn't get many comments. In all, there were 575 comments on the posts—an average (mean) of 2.5 per blog—but 145 blogs (almost 63%) had no comments at all, frequently because they weren't allowed (at least 62 blogs don't allow comments). Another 21 blogs had one comment each and 18 more had only two.

The *median* number of comments is zero, since more than half the blogs had no comments. Fact is, it can be tough to get comments on an official blog—particularly if it doesn't involve trash-talking teenagers.

If the median number of comments is zero, the median comments per post must also be zero. The mean number of comments per post—the average—is a tiny 0.1, and only 51 blogs (22%) manage to beat that average. here are the 37 blogs (16%) with at least 0.3 comments per post during the three months:

Illustrations

Some book and book review blogs use book covers to illustrate almost every post. Some blogs include a fair number of photographs. Some use icons. And, of course, some blogs don't use illustrations at all: 96 of the 231 blogs (more than 41%) had not a single illustration during the three-month study period. In all, there were 3,662 illustrations attached to the 6,229 posts—but that's a misleading figure, since one blog accounts for 1,975 of those 3,662 illustrations.

The average number of illustrations is 15.9; excluding that one heavily-illustrated case, the average is 7.3 illustrations. The median is one. Roughly the top quintile begins at 12 illustrations over three months—about two-thirds more than the adjusted average.

With so many blogs having no illustrations at all, the median illustrations per post is naturally quite low: 0.1. The mean is 0.4 illustrations per post.

The top group in this case is 42 blogs with at least 0.9 illustrations per post—17% of the blogs.

Total Length of Posts

Here's a metric that doesn't appear directly within blog profiles: Total words in all posts for March through May 2007. "Words" includes internal post overhead such as "Permalink" or "x Comments" or "Posted on..." but not sidebar material.

The complete set of posts totaled 852,930 words—roughly eight full-length novels. The average blog had 3,692 words in all its posts, while the median was 2,244 words. Fifty-six blogs had fewer than 1,000 words each.

In this case, the set of "long blogs" is just under 20% of all blogs, using 6,000 words as a cutoff:

Average Post Length

The "average average" post length—that is, the average of all words-per-post figures for the blogs—was 177.7 words, roughly two typical paragraphs. The median was 143.5 words, roughly one long paragraph.

Uniquely for this metric, it makes sense to point out two outlying groups: The blogs with considerably longer-than-average posts ("essays," but many of these aren't long enough for that term) and the blogs with considerably *shorter*-than-average posts ("terse blogs," in some cases just lists of authors, titles and maybe call numbers). I'm using the same criteria for long and terse posts as in *Public Library Blogs*: 252 Examples—more than 250 words and fewer than 90 words, respectively.

Miscellany

A few odd notes on this collection of academic library blogs:

- ➤ Just over half of the blogs—128—have signed comments, although the signature may be "library" or the like.
- ➤ Fifty-nine blogs are hosted on Blogspot and use Blogger software; another six blogs hosted elsewhere use Blogger.
- ➤ Thirty-eight blogs use WordPress software; of those, 15 are hosted by WordPress.
- Twelve blogs identified Movable Type as the software being used; three are at TypePad.

Comparing Academic and Public Library Blogs

Since *Public Library Blogs*: 252 *Examples* used the same rules for inclusion, the same study period and the same metrics as this book, it's possible to make some comparisons between the two types of library blogs.

- Academic library blogs tend to have slightly more frequent posts than public library blogs.
- Academic library blogs have even fewer comments than public library blogs—and on a comments-per-post basis, the difference is striking.
- ➤ Eliminating the one academic library blogs with a huge number of illustrations, academic library blogs have about half as many illustrations as public library blogs.

- ➤ While the average (mean) total length of posts is slightly higher for public library blogs, the median length is slightly higher for academic blogs—but only by about 10%.
- Individual posts also tend to be slightly longer in public library blogs.

In Closing

Pardon the repetition. It's inherent in the fact that these chapters come from two related books.

If you're interested in the individual blog profiles, which include all relevant metrics and more, these books are still available from Amazon (paperback) and Lulu (PDF ebook). For that matter, if you find some blog names ambiguous, the geographically-arranged book makes them easy to identify.

The books will go out of print (taken off sale) after three months with no sales. That means the books will be available at least through June 2009.

My Back Pages Changing Everything

I should probably have included PC World's December 2008 "FuturTech" set of Hot New Technologies for 2009 in the March Predictions roundup—but maybe it works just as well here. After all, we're told in the first paragraph that the memristor "is already starting to revolutionize everything we know about computing." That's a tall order for a device that only exists in labs (and represents a concept that's 38 years old). As one who would love to replace CFLs with LED lights, preferably OLED, who thought I'd be able to buy either an OLED HDTV (bigger than 12") or an FED HDTV a couple of years ago, I'd surely love to believe that creating something in a laboratory means it's right around the corner in vast commercial quantities—but it rarely works that way. "Researchers say that no real barrier prevents implementing the memristor in circuitry immediately." Even though there are no commercial products and none expected until 2012, the article still says this development "is already starting to revolutionize" and says memristors "will likely replace both DRAM and hard disks" in 2014-2016! Of course, based on predictions like that, hard disks disappeared more than a decade ago. Didn't they?

What else? Your single-core CPU is "officially a dinosaur" (so much for all those netbooks!) and we'll have 32-core CPUs Real Soon Now. (If everything's moving to the cloud, why would you need 32-core CPUs in your netbooks? Silly question, I suppose.)

After—yawn—64-bit computing, we get this lovely headline: "Windows 7: It's Inevitable." They're going to come to your door and *force* you to turn in your Mac OS X, Linux, Vista and Windows XP machines in favor of Windows 7.

But here's a fast shiny new toy to distract you while the "inevitable" happens: USB 3.0, since the sluggish 480Mb speed of USB 2.0 "just doesn't cut it any longer." Instead, you'll get 4.8Gb/second throughput. I'm sure you're chafing at the bit, finding that USB 2.0 is the bottleneck in your everyday computing, right? (The article also suggests a boost in FireWire speed—but what new computers even ship with FireWire since Apple went to USB 2.0?)

What else? The ever-promising wireless power transmission—although this time it's over a distance of "a few feet" with 70% efficiency, which seems like a truly awful idea in a time when ecology is supposed to matter. Hand gestures to control your wall-size TV (if you're thinking what I'm thinking, stop it!). And a bunch of other stuff, some of it probably quite reasonable. A sidebar includes some of their "greatest hits" and "biggest misses" in 25 years of predictions—but a "hit" depends on your interpretation. A 1988 prediction said we'd all have a little box containing all our files and programs, and would carry it with us all the time. Their take? That's a big hit—but "for most people, that little box is now also their MP3 player or cell phone." Really? Most people carry all their files and programs on their MP3 player or cell phone?

Pity the Poor Leveler

An editorial in the February 2009 Stereophile offers another take on why the True Golden-Eared Audiophiles hear "huge" differences between vastly expensive pieces of audio equipment and only moderately expensive alternatives—while the rest of us may hear no differences at all, and certainly not the kind of difference that justifies spending half a megabuck on a stereo system.

It's a psychological theory, another nice black-and-white distinction, saying we're either Sharpeners or Levelers. Sharpeners exaggerate differences (or, in their minds, are capable of distinguishing differences) while Levelers minimize or ignore differences (or, in the minds of Sharpeners, are deaf). And maybe it's an inherent personality characteristic—different people simply have different "just noticeable difference" levels. Or maybe, as the writer suggests, it's learned—and learning to exaggerate (sorry, "notice") difference is "part of the learning process of becoming an audio-

phile." Oddly, in giving an example, the writer assumes that "seasoned audiophiles" will in fact *hear* differences in every case—but that the "relative sharpener" will call the difference something like "a lifting of several veils" while the "relative leveler" will say the difference, "while worthwhile, is fairly small." Emphasis added: The writer does not admit to the possibility that a seasoned audiophile will say "What difference?" or "That difference isn't worth a dime, much less \$50K."

And, of course, to be a reviewer, you must be a Sharpener—able to hear minute differences and deem them important. Or maybe to hear differences whether they're there or not...

(The writer is actually arguing that, once you've chosen your system, you should switch back to Leveler mode so you can actually enjoy listening to the music. Can you really switch learned hyperacuity and the tendency to exaggerate differences on and off that easily?)

Think I'm kidding about the half-megabuck system? In *The Absolute Sound*'s February 2009 report on the Rocky Mountain Audio Fest, Steven Stone's "best sound" award goes to Ray Kimber's room—a system costing \$535,000, *not* including turntable (unless I'm mistaken). On the other hand, another room at RMAF was, apparently, very impressive—and total cost of the full system was \$7,200, which would be less than one-fifth of the *sales tax* on the Kimber system in California.

Ending Debates

The March 2009 *Absolute Sound* spells it out simply, in a piece by Robert Harley on choosing an LP playback system: "It's worth noting that at the highest levels of music playback, there's not much of a debate; LP is the clear winner." And, if you believe Harley, it's not even a matter of the CD standard being refined enough: "There's just a fundamental musical rightness to a pure analog source (one that has never been digitized) that seems to better convey the music's expressiveness (and to more completely involve the listener in that expressiveness)."

That's it: There's not much of a debate. If you're a True Audiophile, you know that digitization destroys music by chopping it up into little slices. Never mind the strong indication that much of the LP mystique has to do with—as also noted in this piece—setting up and tweaking a turntable, "putting a large black disc on a slowly rotating turntable" and all that. Harley admits that LPs mistrack, have ticks and pops, have surface noise and wear badly—but proper listeners "hear past the LP's flaws and enjoy the medium's

overall musicality." See, all those problems are *nothing* compared to "the distortion imposed by digitally encoding and decoding an audio signal." The piece continues into outright advocacy—basically, Harley says that if you think CDs sound good you just haven't heard a good LP setup.

Which really makes you wonder about another article in this "analog focus" issue of the magazine: "Converting LPs to digital files: A step-by-step process." The author, Steven Stone, calls it "archiving." Stone's definitely a high-ender: He spends "at least 40 minutes" just tweaking his turntable and arm before each digitization session. But why would you do this at all? Haven't you destroyed the musicality by digitally encoding it, even at the high data rates Stone recommends? (It's an interesting article in other ways: After noting Apple Lossless and FLAC data formats, both of which compress files with absolutely no loss of data, Stone adds: "[D]epending on the software used and your own degree of perfectionism you may find that any amount of data compression, even if lossless, is unacceptable." What part of **lossless** do these people not understand? "Lossless" means that precisely the same bitstream emerges from decompression as went into compression.

Ah, but it gets even better. Stone talks about "archiving" and Harley admits that records slowly wear away (not so slowly if you're not careful)—but in a turntable review later in the issue, Robert E. Greene says "vinyl is, to all intents and purposes, eternal." Really! (Honest, I couldn't make these things up. Oddly, the turntable reviewed is relatively cheap: A mere \$2,850. I did say "relatively.")
